Tribute to Maryse Condé

Caribbean Crossings

Celebrated Guadeloupean author Maryse Condé has left us on 2 April 2024 at the age of 90. A strong contender for the Nobel Prize in Literature, she was best known for her novel Segu, which deals with the African diaspora that resulted from slavery and colonialism in the Caribbean. Mirroring a conference on Maryse Condé at Goldsmiths University, this discussion will delve into the intricacies of mixed identities in the Caribbean. Renowned writers **Jean D'Amérique** (Haiti), **Estelle-Sarah Bulle** (Guadeloupe), and **Jason Allen-Paisant** (Jamaica) will talk about the Caribbean's influence on their work with **Prof. Clare Finburgh Delijani** (Goldsmiths University), engaging with questions of migration, heritage, justice, and creativity.

Paris, 1985. Vanessa is thirteen when she meets Gabriel Matzneff. A very smart and manipulative man, the fifty-year-old renowned writer seduces the young girl. The adolescent becomes the lover and muse of a man celebrated by the cultural and political establishment. Losing herself in the relationship, she gradually starts to realise how destructive and abnormal the situation is, until she finally sees Gabriel Matzneff for the predator he really is. Based on the autobiographical book by writer Vanessa Springora, Consent takes the public onto a long journey through trauma and healing as she attempts to free herself from a man's powerful influence.


Historical Perspectives

But approaching retirement and surrounded by political inertia, she is feeling disillusioned. In a mineral black and white that breaks with the usual blue sky of Marseille, *I Will Never Heal* summons three anonymous figures, two men and a woman, whose lives are exposed and intertwined through fragments of existences and stories. The film tells us about the way these three people ward off and overcome an unfavourable fate (blindness, imprisonment), or simply the throes of life (mourning). Pagnol - The Marseille Trilogy

The Marseille Trilogy is a cinematic masterpiece that captures the soul and spirit of the French port city through the lens of one of its most eloquent children, Marcel Pagnol, Comprising three iconic films, *Marius* (1931), *Fanny* (1932), and *César* (1936), this trilogy is an exploration of love, family, and the rugged beauty of Marseille's landscape.

Marius FILM

dir. Alexander Korda, 1931, 127 mins, 4K Restoration

Marius is a young man who loves his gruff and goodnatured father César, and also Fanny, who sells shells in front of César's bar. Since his childhood, the desire to run the world inflames him. He doesn't want to abandon his father, who might die of grief, nor Fanny, who thinks only of him. And yet the sea is there...

César marks the culmination of the Marseille trilogy. It ties up the stories of the characters introduced in *Marius* and *Fanny*, showcasing their growth and evolution through time. It is the only movie within the trilogy specifically crafted for the cinema and directed by Marcel Pagnol himself.

Young Marcel, the son of a seamstress and a school teacher, quickly learns how to read and write. The whole Pagnol family takes off to their vacation spot in the hills, where they have rented a house. Marcel meets Lili, a local boy who knows all the secrets of the hills, and the two quickly become best friends. But, as the holiday comes to an end, Marcel must leave both his newfound friend and the wildlife he became so found of.

Every weekend the Pagnol family faces a very long walk under the hot sun to be able to spend two days in their lovely La Treille. Shortcuts across private estates make the task more bearable. Until one day, a stubborn caretaker catches them trespassing. Years later, Marcel buys a land with a castle and realises it is the very one his mother was so afraid of cutting across.

The Goldman Case

dir. Cédric Kahn, 2023, 116 mins Winning Arieh Worthalter the 2024 César for Best Actor, The Goldman *Case* is a semi-biographical courtroom drama powerfully recreating the trial of Pierre Goldman in 1976 France, which was widely acknowledged as the most divisive case since the Drevfus Affair of 1894. Prosecuted for a double murder during the armed robbery of a Parisian pharmacy, Goldman, the rebellious son of Polish-Jewish immigrants, refused to call any witnesses to his character. Goldman accused the police of institutional antisemitism and racism in a book that was used to cancel his first trial.


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
